SCOTTISH TOURISTS ANNIVERSARY GAZETTE

It's the 23^{rd of} August 2023 and it's been 100 years since the Scottish Touring team visited our club. To commemorate this, I have collected together a number of my favourite articles which include the Scottish tour of 1923, the South African tour of 1926, and the Australian tour of 1930. Other articles of interest covering this early period in our history are included, as well as some even earlier articles covering local bowls clubs which many of our members belonged to, before our club was founded in 1920. All the articles, article excerpts and advertisements included in these pages are transcribed as they appear on the British Newspaper Archive. The only exception to this being where a known name has been spelt incorrectly (which happens quite often!). These instances will be marked by *.

SCOTTISH TOURISTS IN LONDON

The Scottish bowling team, including W.H. Scoullar, Scottish Champion, 1922-23, and many internationals, arrived in London on Saturday and yesterday, and have made the Hotel York, Barnes Street, their headquarters. The London Scottish B.A. have arranged the programme during the stay of the Scots for two weeks, and many interesting fixtures are included. The full list is as follows: -



SCOTS' SUCCESSFUL TOUR

The second tour of the Scottish bowlers to London has been a round of successes in comparison to the first visit in 1921, when they returned to a deficit of 46 shots. Only one match at Wallington, was abandoned on account of bad weather, and after playing 15 ends the bowlers wisely retired, drenched to the skin with the local club four shots up. This match is not included in the records, which show the Scots losing two games, one against the London and S.C.B.A., the other at Banister Park, Southampton, tieing one with the North of London Scots, and defeating the South of London Scots Bounds Green club, the Civil Service B.A., and the London Scottish B.A., in the test match. The Edinburgh rink, composted of A. Martin, D. Hutton, G. Thomson and W.H. Scouller, the champion, played in the seven matches and won every one. This is the record of any combine on the tour, and considering that Martin, Scouller and Thomson each skipped, is a tribute to the combination and quality of the quartette.

R. Woodburn, Dalmuir, won four of his five matches, an excellent performance and the Willowbank rink lost only one of the seven matches in which they were playing. They were lucky in having their day off on the Wallington visit, which did not count.

The game was the most peculiar one, as far as scoring was concerned, and at half-time the visitors had a good lead. The second moiety, however, levelled up matters somewhat, and at the last two ends the teams were level.

Carshalton (Surrey), that gem of rustic beauty, possesses a bowling green in addition to its other charms. Their latest conflict against Worthing, an annual match very popular with both clubs. Receiving a hearty welcome from their seaside opponents after their journey, The men of Carshalton – or "Kaseharten," as it is called in the local vernacular – indulged in an excellent dinner put on for them at the Albion Hotel, Worthing.

From thence these friendly enemies proceeded to the pretty green in Homefield Park. Proving exciting from the start, the match concluded in favour of Carshalton by only one shot. Carshalton scores: C. Townsend, W. Young, H. Cowlishaw, S. B. Hill (skip), 11-23; W. Aurbach, C. R Welsman, T. Farrow, C.W Edwards (skip), 20-10; P. Best, A. Bottone, F. R. Welsman, F. Barber (skip), 26-14. The interesting skirmish finished up with high tea served on the lawn.

Saturday was a rather busy day for Wallington, as they were engaged in a friendly match (3 rinks) with the Heathfield B.C. on their green at Wandsworth Common, which they just failed to win by 3 points; they also sent 2 rinks to play at the Reading West B.C. at Reading, and entertained 2 rinks of that club at Wallington in the Shield Competition of the London and Southern Counties Bowling Association, and won the match with an aggregate score of 96-63. On Friday Messrs Cowlishaw* and Ridley won the pairs or the same Association.

SCOTTISH TOUR OF 1921

The Scottish bowlers who are in London has a less strenuous but none the less enjoyable time last week. The previous week they were engaged in big matches with London Districts. Last week they pitted themselves against some of the bigger London clubs. Unfortunately, some of the best players had to go back to Scotland after the first week. Perhaps that accounts for the fact that out of their five games during the week the Scots won only one. They lost to Wallington by 69 to 44, to South London by 87-68, to Norwood by 33-31 and to Balham by 46-34. Their only win was against Belmont Club, Streatham, which they defeated by 47 points to 36.

THE NEW ZEALAND CUP

The annual competition promoted by the Wallington Bowling Club for the handsome silver cup presented to the Club by members of the New Zealand Bowling team who visited England last season was held at the headquarters of the Wallington B.C., at Grosvenor-road on Whit-Monday. The trophy is the only one the New Zealanders presented to any English club, and the competition is known as Barnett's Progressive Pairs, and is so arranged that no two players are paired a second time, and no player appears on the same rink twice. The game is over seven ends, the winners each counting one point. Eight rinks were required on Monday; thus there were 32 entrants. Great enthusiasm was evinced by all the players, and some particularly good bowling was witnessed by those privileged to see the play. The cup was eventually secured by L. H. Greaves (skip) and L. J. Greaves (lead), the runners-up being skip Cowlishaw* and lead J. Catford.

This is the second year Mr. Beattie has secured this distinction, he having won the beautiful challenge cup in 1919.

The semi-finals and final were played on Wednesday at the Heathfield club's ground, Wandsworth Common. In the semi-final Beattie beat Eves, of Wimbledon, 21-4, and **Mitchell,** of Wallington, beat Glover, of Bounds Green, North London.

In the final an exciting tussle was seen. At one period **Mitchell** was leading 17-8, but after that did not score again, and Beattie went through to win 21-17.

The situation, however, was suddenly altered by a happy inspiration of the new landlord of the Railway Hotel, Mr Tom Agate, who suggested turning the garden at the rear of the hostelry into a real live bowling green. Apparently, the brewers (Messrs. Breeds and Co.) were willing listeners to such an excellent idea, and in a very short time the representative of the brewers, with true business acumen and in a real sporting spirit, met the local club, with the result that a scheme for providing a good class Bowling Green at the Railway Hotel was made practical. The laying of the greens was put in the capable hands of Mr James Mitchell, the groundsman of the famous Wallington Bowling Club, and the work is now nearing completion.

Showman, F.C. Warts) defeated Erismus (T. E. Just, W. R. Pyle, J. R. Macdonald) by 21 to 13; and in the single rink championship, Wallington (J. Vance, W.T. Ridley, F.G. Tull*, H. **Cowlishaw**) defeated Northwood, holders (W. Baker, S.B. Plummer, J. Kenyon, H. Robinson) by 26 to 17.

The team representing the W.C.B.A Executive concluded its week's tour in London on Saturday by a visit to Staines, Middlesex. When they won their second match of the tour. On Monday they met a formidable array of players representing Wallington including R. J. Heald, A. M. Willis, F. Barber, and E.E. Moore, Vice President of the E.B.A. This rink represented the Surrey Executive, and opposed Mr. M. Wale, Three Spires, who lost by 25 shots to 30. Other noted players included Mr S. **J. Pike**, English international 1911-1912, E.E. Moore English international 1919-20-21-22-23-24-25, R. Knights, 1909-10-13, G. Chilver 1919, **J. Skegg**, A. E. Hume, **A. C.** Macdonald, A. J. Morriss, J. Shaw, F. Biggin and J. O. Grant. The result was Wallington won by 153 to 111, all the W.C.B.A rinks losing with the exception of Mr C. H. Butland, who tied.
